FROM THE MINISTER

Did you know that on average, we print 450 pages every week to prepare our Order of Service and our Announcements? Many times, most of that paper goes straight into recycling at the end of the service. Over the past year though, we've been relying more and more on our large video screen to show the order of service. We're also not clear that most people find the printed announcements easy to navigate these days with so many good things going on in our community. In consultation with the Board, the office and our Sunday Programs Committee, we have decided to begin moving over to a paper-light Sunday. In the coming month, we will transition to relying solely on the video screen for our order of service. In consultation with Castle Care, the office will be bringing in an attractive cork board to the Social Hall. Volunteers will update announcements

on the new bulletin board. It will be an opportunity to add in photos, and the occasional flyer, to our announcements without having to print 150 to 300 pages weekly.

We have set up an on-line submission form for events and announcements to ease the process of submissions, along with NEW e-PUBLICATIONS GUIDELINES.

As of December 1, we will begin to use this system for FLASH, BEACON, FACEBOOK, OOS, JOYS & CONCERNS Events and Announcements submissions.

The full transition to paper-light Orders of Service will likely take through the end of January as we help members get used to the online forms and our Fellowship gets used to the cork board. For a time, we'll use both the cork board and print.

THE LONG ISLAND MINISTERIAL LEAVE PROGRAM: HELP from our neighboring UUs When We Need It!

The Long Island Ministerial Leave Program (LIMLP) was established by the Long Island Cluster of the Metro New York District Chapter of the UU Ministers Association about seven years ago. Any Long Island UU Congregation can be a member of the program. The purpose of the program is to reduce the stress on congregations whose minister is taking some kind of leave from his or her duties. In any given year a UU minister on Long Island may take a sabbatical leave or need to take time off for personal reasons. LIMLP sees that the congregation whose minister is on leave receives pulpit coverage by a minister for one Sunday a month and emergency pastoral care coverage by a minister for one month, each for up to six months per year.

Participating congregations covenant with their own minister(s) and with other LIMLP member congregations to lend (one of) their minister(s) no more than twice annually to a congregation whose minister is on leave. The minister serves a leave pulpit on a Sunday s/he would normally be preaching at their home congregation, not on a day off. The minister's home congregation agrees to make other arrangements to cover their own pulpit that Sunday. The LIMLP has been working smoothly all these years and recently created a new and clearer version of its guiding documents. With gladness and in the spirit of collegiality and community our congregation has signed an agreement to commit to participation in this program for the next six years.

The Rev. Margie Allen and Frances McGuire of the UU Fellowship at Stony Brook are the current Program Managers. The other participating congregations are: Shelter Rock, Huntington, Freeport and Bridgehampton. We expect membership in the LIMLP to grow in the next few years. Our minister, Rev. Jude Geiger, and lay leader, Carol Towne, are the program representatives from our congregation. Please feel free to direct any questions you might have to either of us.

Committee on Ministry (COM) is committed to supporting our Congregation's health and well-being as we journey forward, encountering issues and the collective decisions made regarding those issues. In this process, COM has become increasingly aware of the importance, strengths and challenges of our cherished 5th Principle, by which we pledge to affirm and promote: *The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large.*

We of the UUFH make diligent efforts to include all when decisions are at hand. Nevertheless, in a congregation of our size, disagreement can cause anguish to those who hold a minority opinion and

to the congregation as a whole, who feel respect and compassion for the dissenters. Perhaps the greatest challenge for life in a democracy is the ability to live joyfully even when on the minority side of a decision.

As Rev. Audette Fulbright of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Roanoke, Virginia states: "The democratic process, while not easy, is the best governing principle for a free people that the crafters of our seven principles could conceive."

Rev. Theresa Novak of the Berkeley, California Fellowship of Unitarian Universalists states, "We have our other principles to guide us as we practice democracy..." In particular, Rev. Fulbright stresses the importance of our 6th Principle, which alludes to our overarching UU mission and vision: *The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all.*

As always, the COM is available to offer support for members who might be struggling with Congregational decisions. We're committed to doing whatever we can to help members find a way to live well with the majority's final decisions. May we all draw strength and meaning from our 7 Principles and continue to honor and respect the individual while embracing the democratic process.

Wednesday, Dec. 3 - 12 pm/1 pm


